Assessment system

Assessment of students' learning outcomes is carried out by the University according to the cumulative 100-point system.

Current control is carried out during lectures and practical (seminar) classes and aims to assess the level of students' readiness to perform particular tasks, and is assessed by the amount of scored points.

The maximum amount during the semester – 60 points; the minimum amount required is 35 points. Final control is carried out at the end of the semester in the form of an exam (the maximum amount is 40 points, the minimum amount required is 25 points).

Current control includes the following assessment methods: assignments on topics; current control papers; presentation of a selected report and writing an essay.
